The Ridgewood School Alumni Dinner was held the evening of September 24 on the school lawn. Beneath a large tent that provided for social distancing, more than 100 alumni, faculty, family, and friends enjoyed being together to reminisce and celebrate. The warm, autumn evening began with a social hour filled with enjoyable music, animated conversations, oral histories being recorded by Kevin Rose, Ridgewood parent and The Turner Foundation historian, and copies of the recently published school history being signed by its author, Tim Noonan '66.

Guests were greeted by Ridgewood Board President Adam Russell and Head of School Aliya Ranginwala. Following Imam Mustafaa Islam's invocation, Ridgewood Student Council members served the dinner that had been prepared by Seasons Kitchen. After dinner, Mr. Russell presented Ridgewood's Distinguished Alumni Award to five Ridgewood alumni who have distinguished themselves by their outstanding achievements in their chosen fields; their participation in local, state, or national affairs or service to society; and their outstanding support of Ridgewood School. Honored as Distinguished Alumni were Catherine Corry Blakemore '45, Timothy T. Noonan '66, and three siblings, Afshan Ahmed Syed '83, Ashfaq T. Ahmed, MD '84, and Amer F. Ahmed, EdD '92.

Mrs. Blakemore is the CEO of Adams Pomeroy Press in Albany, Wisconsin, and the author of nine books. Mr. Noonan is founder of Noonan Communications and of Heritage Histories, for which he has authored and published more than 30 ghosted memoirs and corporate, school and family histories. Mrs. Afshan Ahmed Syed, a supporter of various local civic and cultural organizations and a loyal, dedicated Ridgewood advocate and

volunteer, is president-elect of the Ridgewood School Association. Ashfaq T. Ahmed, MD, a dedicated and visionary past-president of the Ridgewood School Association, is a highly respected Springfield physician. Amer F. Ahmed, EdD, an intercultural diversity expert, author and speaker, now serves as Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at University of Vermont.

Ridgewood's Honorary Alumni Award was then presented to our 2021 honorees: Ms. Shahana Ahmed; Tajuddin Ahmed, MD; Aristides "Art" Gianakopoulos and Alexandra Gianakopoulos. The four, although not Ridgewood alumni, were recognized for having served Ridgewood with distinction and for having made a significant contribution of time, effort and/or resources to the school's welfare, reputation, or prestige. Their faithful and distinguished service allows Ridgewood to present them as role models for Ridgewood students.

Because last year's dinner was cancelled due to COVID restrictions, the Distinguished Alumni and Honorary Alumni of 2020 were also recognized. 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### Fall Semester Student Council Report

Our Ridgewood Student Council has been extremely busy since last school year and has made a significant impact on student life and life in the Springfield community. The student council began the year in August by hosting for our students the Ridgewood Olympics. In September council members participated

During the weekend of our Alumni Dinner, they set up a booth at the local Farmers' Market and sold produce grown in the Ridgewood garden, salsa they had made with Mrs. Newman using garden produce and items donated by Pendleton's Farm Market, and bread and zucchini brownies they had baked. That afternoon, back at school, Council members hosted our annual Fall Festival.

Later in the semester the student Council held its annual Waffle Breakfast fundraiser and contributed \$1,050 to the Breast Cancer Endowment Fund. The Council also created its own Ridgewood Alzheimer's Walk and raised \$500 for

the Alzheimer's Association. October concluded with the Council presenting our annual Halloween Bash that featured a haunted house created by the 8th graders and Mr. Sauter. In November students celebrated Kindness Day by writing positive messages in chalk to their big/little siblings. During Buckeye Week, buckeye candies and necklaces were made to sell at lunch. The Student Council took on the responsibility of the school's annual Thanksgiving Pie Sale this year and sold more than 240 pies, including 60 that were donated to families with the IHN Homeless Shelter and Project Woman. In December, the Student Council hosted the annual babysitting night with crafts, games, cookie decorating, and a movie.

Ridgewood Student Council's fall community involvement was extensive. At the end of the summer, Council members returned to the Second Harvest Food Bank where they filled boxes for senior citizens, sorted food donations, and helped in other areas. In November, the Council collected more than six boxes of hygiene products that they donated to the Food Bank. This fall, the Food Bank recognized our students for their

support. (See article on page 10.) Early in the fall Council members collected and donated school supplies and book bags to the Rocking Horse Center. They also donated to the IHN Homeless Shelter 40 bags of food for Thanksgiving dinners, as well as cards and treat bags filled with goodies and small toys for its young residents.

Veterans Day saw our students sending 100 thank-you cards to veterans and donating \$525 to Honor Flight, an organization that flies veterans to their memorials in Washington, D.C. In addition to contributing Thanksgiving meal items, including pies from its pie sale, to Project Woman, our students created and posted flags and signs announcing

In their computer class and Craft Club, students designed ornaments with which they decorated a tree they then donated to the Trees for Tots program. Throughout the fall local nursing home residents enjoyed receiving jack-o'-lanterns, cookies, cards and ornaments for the various fall holidays and our police force, fire department, and hospital staffs appreciated the baked goods they received from our Student Council.\*\*

What can parents and middle schools do to prepare students for success in high school?



#### **Book Review**

#### Ridgewood School: The Little School in the Woods at 100

Ridgewood School:
The Little School in
the Woods at 100,
the long-awaited
history of our little
jewel, is an immense
achievement by
historian Tim Troupe
Noonan '66. The
school could not
have found a more



perfectly suited historian to take on this task. Noonan is the grandson of Harry Kissell, the developer who created the Ridgewood neighborhood, and the son of Mary Lu Kissell Noonan '27, one of the school's earliest graduates. Noonan himself also spent a decade at Ridgewood between 1956 and 1966, a transformative period in the school's history. The book combines the objective analysis one would expect from a historical tome with the firsthand experiences of a personal memoir. Noonan weaves these together seamlessly, resulting in a publication that enlightens, delights, and inspires.

The book opens with an exploration of Springfield during the First World War. Noonan creatively takes the reader on a trolley ride to witness the city through the eyes of Marthena Winger, Ridgewood's first principal. This sets the stage for the founding of Ridgewood School, which sprang from the same passion and zeal that earned Springfield the title of "Best 60,000 City in America." The first several chapters present a school often on the brink of closure, although we can rest comfortably knowing that it will ultimately prevail. Noonan shows Ridgewood School as an evolution, always adapting and changing to meet the challenges and opportunities of the times. \*\*

### Alumni Spotlights

Phillip Trimble '49, former U.S. Ambassador to Nepal and former Vice-Provost for International Studies and Overseas Programs in UCLA's College of Letters and Sciences, lives today in New York City with his wife Valeria Vasilevski. Professor Emeritus Trimble is the author of *United States Foreign* Relations Law (2002) and (with Barry Carter) an International Law casebook. He has also written numerous articles found in various law journals and other publications. In addition to his distinguished careers in law, education, and government service, as a mountaineer, Ambassador Trimble climbed on five continents and in 1976 led the American Expedition to Mt. Everest.



Caro-Gray Bosca '69, a graduate of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts at Tufts

University in Boston, has for more than twenty years been a partner in Hughes-Bosca where she creates pieces of jewelry that are "compelling works of art that become something a person wants and must have for their own." She and her business partner and collaborator, Mary Hughes, are recognized nationally as master goldsmiths and have been invited to display their creations in major shows and museums including the Peabody

Essex Museum, National Museum for Women in the Arts, the Smithsonian, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Fuller Craft Museum. Their inspired jewelry can be viewed at hughesbosca. com or in their Side Street Gallery in Gloucester, Massachusetts.
